The Huot Technical Center, located on our high school's campus, offers robust, career-based programming in the following occupations: Careers in Education, Allied Health, Health Science, Plumbing and Heating, Building Construction, Law Enforcement, Culinary Arts, Manufacturing and Engineering Technology, Automotive Technology, Digital Media Arts, Computer Programming, Bio-Medical Technology, and Business Management. This gives our students real-world experiences, while making connections with employers around the community, to help make informed decisions about their future after high school.

Project Extra, our after-school program offered throughout the district, provides a variety of opportunities for students to stretch their learning. Community members are often invited in to display their achievements and positively influence their young minds.

The path widens after high school with a variety of avenues to consider. Some students may choose to jump right into the work force and live on their own, while others may decide to venture towards a two or four-year college. No matter the path, the staff in Laconia are present to help navigate their journey. Along their journey they may meet new
